Bohemian waxwing

The Bohemian waxwing is a bird of far northern latitudes around the world. These birds are found in the north and northwest, spending summers in Alaska and western Canada. In winter, though, they move south and east, overlapping with the more common and widespread Cedar waxwing, with flocks reaching the Atlantic coast in eastern Canada and the New England states. Or they may move southward in the Rockies, getting as far as Colorado.

FACTS

- ⇒ Bohemian waxwings, unlike many songbirds, do not hold breeding territories, and they also don't have a true song. They communicate with high-pitched calls as they roam around in large groups looking for fruit
- ⇒ Only three species of waxwings exist in the world, the Bohemian waxwing of North America and Eurasia, the Cedar waxwing of North America, and the Japanese waxwing of eastern Asia
- ⇒ Bohemian waxwings have an uncanny ability to find fruit nearly everywhere, almost like they have a GPS tracker for berries. Flocks sometimes turn up in desert areas
- ⇒ Waxwings have red, waxy tips on some of their wing feathers and yellow tips on the tail. The colour comes from carotenoid pigments found in the fruit waxwings eat. As the birds get older, the waxy tips get bigger
- Bohemian waxwings are important seed dispersers: the seeds of the eaten fruit pass through the digestive system and since the waxwings move through a wide area, the seeds get widely dispersed within good fertilizer i.e the rest of the bird poop

Point Pelee Migration



May 9-13, 2023 \$550/person | Leamington, ON

Point Pelee is one of the best known birding destinations in North America. In this short 5 day tour we can expect to see over 150 species, many in their stunning breeding plumage. Up to 30 species of warbler can be encountered on this tour and this total often includes Carolinian specialties such as Prothonotary, Hooded, and Cerulean Warbler Overshoots from the south such as Kentucky, Worm-eating and Prairie Warbler are sometimes observed. However it's not just warblers; at Pelee as we can expect to see various other passerines such such as vireos thrushes and sparrows. Beyond songbirds, we will also see numerous shorebirds and waterfowl also on their migration journey. At Point Pelee the possibilities are truly endless! ONLY TWO SPACES REMAINING!

Cold Lake Warblers



June 1-4, 2023 \$425/person | Cold Lake, AB

While Cold Lake is not yet widely known as a top birding destination, but this secret won't be kept for long! Located in northeastern Alberta along the Saskatchewan border, Cold Lake boasts an impressive 22 species of breeding warbler. Mouth-watering species such as Connecticut, Blackburnian, and Chestnut-sided can be found reliably. However, it is not just warblers that make Cold Lake special, tantalizing boreal species; Yellow Rail, Nelson's Sparrow, LeConte's Sparrow, Boreal Chickadee and others are not uncommon. On this tour we do not only focus on detecting these warblers, our goal is to get extended views that provide excellent photographic opportunities.

Great Backyard Bird Count

February 17-20, 2023

The Great Backyard Bird Count is an annual four-day event that engages bird enthusiasts of all ages around the world in counting birds to create a real-time snapshot of where the birds are. Anyone can participate, from beginners to experts. You can count for as little as 15 minutes on a single day, or for as long as you like each day of the event. It's free, fun, and easy – and it helps the birds! The Great Backyard Bird Count is a joint program of the Cornell Lab of Ornithology and Audubon with Canadian partner Birds Canada.

We think of Bohemian waxwings, colourful winter visitors, as primarily consumers of sugary fruits, but their diet is not exclusively frugivorous. They (and Cedar waxwings) eat sap drips in spring, and aerial insects, especially emergent aquatic species, in the summer.

During the winter, in addition to fruits, Bohemian waxwings also feed on protein-rich foods when they are available. Pictured is one of many Bohemian waxwings that found a goldmine of protein—dead Bald-faced hornet larvae. While the hornet queen overwinters under loose bark or a similarly protected area, the larvae that are developing within the nest when a hard frost hits are killed. Bohemian waxwings apparently recognize this rich source of protein. Scale insects and tree buds (American elm and ash species) are also consumed in the winter and spring. QUESTION: Is the colour of a feeder important to our backyard birds?

RESPONSE: I have been told that a number of folks who have purchased Brome Bird Care feeders are painting the normally green feeders in different colours. While they do it for fun, it is true that some of the larger stores do offer a variety of bright coloured feeders. So, I have been asked....do birds really care about the colour of a given feeder? Well, there was actually a study done on this in 2017, albeit with feeder

birds in the UK. Students at the University of Hull offered the same food in eight identical feeders with the same seed but with the metal parts painted in different colours: red, yellow, green, blue, purple, black, silver and white. Over the winter, the students spent 185 hours recording 7,435 visits by 11 different bird species, most of which were various tit species (like our chickadees), house sparrows, and a couple of finch species. Red, yellow and blue were the least favoured followed by white, black and purple....but the birds definitely liked silver and green. I was not surprised that white was not favoured as it is widely believed to act as a warning colour in nature. Even when the students added an ultraviolet reflectance to the blue and red feeders, it did not make them more attractive to birds. Next, the students decided to find out what feeder colours the customers preferred. At a science festival, they presented the same choices to visitors to their booth. While the public did tend to like the brightly coloured feeders, the only colour that was mutually agreed upon between them and the birds was......green. And that is the original colour of all of Brome Bird Care's feeders! Which means that Brome got it right in the first place!

Popular Black-capped chickadee grows brain tissue to survive brutal winter



Winter brings fascinating changes to animals. While mammals add weight to stay warm as they hibernate, birds grow more feathers for their long migratory flight south.

And then there's the Black-capped chickadee, which adds brain tissue, instead of weight or feathers.

The palm-sized bird has a knack for having a good memory—but only in the winter. In colder months, this clever bird survives by feeding on seeds and other food items that it has stored in the ground by memorizing where it buries the

sustenance. When it gets hungry, it returns to the burial sites.

It is only capable of doing this in the winter because the memory portion of its brain—the hippocampus—is hard wired to increase in size. Some Chickadees have been shown to grow the piece of the organ by nearly a third, enabling them to recall hundreds of spots they've buried food.

This is the wonder of science that is being done right now. There are techniques allowing researchers to get very detailed real-time data on change in the hippocampus over time that's demonstrating unequivocally that it's actually getting bigger.
