



#### From their flaming red crest, to their maniacal laughing calls, this is one bird you don't

want to miss. There's no mistaking a Pileated woodpecker call—their loud, escalating shrieks bring to mind a maniacal laugh and can be heard from a distance. The birds also make a rapid series of cuk-cuk sounds in flight and when landing. Territorial calls—useful for alerting other woodpeckers that they've entered a Pileated's turf—are a higher pitched version of this call. The laugh and appearance of the Pileated is often cited as the inspiration for Woody the Woodpecker, but this seems to be inaccurate: credit apparently goes to the Acorn woodpecker.

The species earns its common and species name, *pileatus*, from the flashy red crest that covers the pileum, or top of the bird's head. Both males and females sport this distinctive red crest, but the male's extends further toward the bill.



- 1. The Pileated woodpecker is a fabulous gateway species into birding—especially for young kids Large and easy to observe without binoculars, the Pileated is native to Canada, the Pacific Northwest, and the Eastern half of the United States.
- 2. Excluding the Ivory-billed woodpecker, which is largely believed to be extinct, 22 woodpecker species call North America home. The Pileated is the largest living woodpecker in North America—nearly three times taller than the petite Downy woodpecker
- 3. Pileated pairs historically may have required an area as large as 300 to 900 acres to support nestlings, especially in the West, but some pairs now raise young on fewer than 150 acres. A sure sign that the resilient woodpecker is continuing to adapt: A pair recently nested in a 74 acre state forest on Staten Island in New York City
- 4. They rarely nest in the same tree hollow twice. The strong bill of the Pileated woodpecker chisels a hole in dead (and, occasionally, live) wood to create a home to raise young. Cavity-nesting ducks that can't excavate their own holes, such as Wood ducks, rely on these abandoned Pileated cavities to nest

5. Pileated woodpeckers drum slowly, accelerating and then trailing off at the end, distinguishing them from most other woodpeckers that drum at a steady rate. The can drum close to 17 beats per second and will perform 10 to 30 beats before they take a break. This behaviour helps them defend territories and attract mates as a part of courtship displays. However, louder drumming doesn't conclusively identify a Pileated woodpecker: A tiny Downy woodpecker's drumming can be deceptively loud if it's hammering away on a hollowed-out limb

# Daylight savings will start at 2:00am Sunday, March 10, 2024

Daylight saving time first came into practice in Canada in 1908, after it was first proposed in 1885 by New Zealand entomologist George Hudson. He proposed the change because it would allow him more daylight hours to find and inspect insects.

The first documented cases of daylight saving adopted in the world happened right here in Canada. The small towns of Port Arthur and Fort William—which would eventually merge to become Thunder Bay, Ontario—adopted daylight saving on May 1, 1908.

The Ibis are a group of long-legged wading birds in the family Threskiomitthldae that inhabit wetlands, forest and plains. "Ibis" derives from the Latin and Ancient Greek word for this group of birds. There are 29 extant species

and 4 extinct species of ibis.

A few million years ago, Jamaica was home to one of the strangest boxers in the animal kingdom – a flightless bird called Xenicibis xympithecus - Clubbed-wing ibis that could batter its enemies with club-shaped wings. Xenicibis is a large, extinct, flightless ibis. The only bird that has ever been discovered to have club-like wings.

#### Flaco, the escaped Central Park Zoo owl, dies

Flaco, the rare Eurasian owl that captured the attention of New York City and was dubbed "the most famous owl in the world," died after reportedly colliding with a building on Friday, the Central Park Zoo said.

The beloved bird's death comes just over a year after he escaped from his vandalized exhibit at the Central Park Zoo. The initial findings from a necropsy performed on Saturday February 24th are consistent with death due to "acute traumatic injury," the Zoo said in an update.

Flaco unwittingly transformed from an obscure bird to a cause celebre after being reported missing on February 2, 2023, from the cramped Central Park digs that served as his home since 2010, when he arrived in the city as a fledgling from a North Carolina bird sanctuary. He had been hatched and raised in captivity for the first 12 years of his life.

Flaco had been released from captivity by Central Park vandals, police said. Despite an extreme search, Flaco was able to evade capture for an entire year—and developed a following.



QUESTION: Is it possible for visually challenged people to enjoy birdwatching?

RESPONSE: It is safe to say that one does not come across that many blind birdwatchers out there. But it is also true that many of the world's best birders probably hear and list more birds by their calls and songs than by seeing them. Take the case of one Juan Pablo Culasso, Uruguayan who was born blind but can identify more than 2,000 different kinds of birds by their song. One of his favourite birding places is the tropical cloud forest of the Western Andes in Columbia. Some of his prized singers include the Sepia-brown wren and the Golden-crowned flycatcher. But the big story is that Juan Pablo and his partners in Columbia have

developed birding trails that are helping others who are blind, or have low vision, to visit the cloud forest of San Antonio and enjoy the birds of the region. The route consists of six separate locations in the popular Kilometro18 district, named for its location along a highway that connects Cali with the port city of Buenaventura. It offers accessible roped paths with obstacles removed, tours with specially trained guides, audio recordings of 50 common birds, and even poles with bar codes which provide short audio descriptions of the birds in the region. This important bird area is home to 300 avian species, and Culasso says it is the first birding tourism route for people with visual disabilities in the Americas. One visitor described it this way. "It's wonderful, because it gives you as a blind person, autonomy." And when nature is accessible, Culasso says,

everyone wins.

David M. Bird is Emeritus Professor of Wildlife Biology and the former Director of the Avian Science and Conservation Centre at McGill University. As a past-president of the Society of Canadian Ornithologists, a former board member with Birds Canada, a Fellow of both the American Ornithological Society and the International Ornithological Union, he has received several awards for his conservation and public education efforts. Dr. Bird is a regular columnist on birds for Bird Watcher's Digest and Canadian Wildlife magazines and is the author of several books and over 200 peer-reviewed scientific publications. He is the consultant editor for multiple editions of DK Canada's Birds of Canada, Birds of Eastern Canada, Birds of Western Canada, and Pocket Birds of Canada. 
